These fearless fly fishers convoyed to Cariboo Bonanza Resort on Horse Lake East of 100 Mile House on September 27, 2010 for a week of fishing. After three days of dismal fishing on Horse Lake, Watch Lake, Sheridan Lake and Irish Lake, six of the group finally got into trout on Gustafson Lake with Paul and John also finding some on Edmund Lake. It was so good that all eight returned the next morning. Most of the photos were taken on Gustafson Lake where trout up to 21 in. were taken frequently enough to keep us entertained for a full day. On the last day a few ventured into Earle Lake where Jack four wheeled his truck within a five minute walk from the water. The biggest trout of the week were observed and taken from here. All of the other lakes had big fish showing at surface but were very leery of what we had to offer them. John had a big one on at Sheridan but they were extremely challenging for all of us on the third day of fishing.

The resort was very well equipped, clean, friendly and accommodating hosts (gave us fly fishing tips and sold flies at cost etc.). The group of guys were great cooks (each took a turn presenting one of their favourite dishes), very compatible (would you believe no snoring from eight old guys?), and all had a great sense of humour (endless stories and jokes). This definitely needs a repeat some time — Next Spring? Next Fall?
